THE ENGELEITER FAMILY OF ST. PAUL wanted a complete makeover. That was two years ago, when the Tudor Revival in St. Paul became their second home. Interior designer David Heide carried out his assignment to make the house beautiful, comfortable,

and private-feeling. The family left the details to him, and loved the result. In the dining room, a window was built to fit the contours of an existing arch, and together with a new built-in buffet blocks the view of a neighbor's garage. Colored art glass added character and charm, an idea repeated in the sunroom. Original ceiling moldings were enhanced, radia-

tors sheathed in wood, Oriental rugs laid over refinished wood floors. After applying fresh paint and hanging custom-made curtains (actually Roman shades, except in the living room), Heide furnished the house from top to bottom. The eclectic mix of reproduction antiques (mostly from Holly Hunt and Baker Knapp and Tubbs) look like they've always lived here.

Custom draperies designed with a banner motif by David Heide pick up the color of the dining room, and complement the pale blue walls and pink stone fireplace surround. The dazzling mirrored-glass coffee table makes a great conversation piece.



Blue and pink can co-exist! Raspberry pink Roman shades pick up the tones of a whimsical loveseat and upholstered stools. The bed frame, curvy-legged bedside table, and Kate Spade bed linens and rug add cool blues and greens.

Heide couldn't resist a Deco-style, three-part mirrored-glass coffee table for the living room—a perfect complement to the gleaming silver and crystal pieces displayed behind glass in a handsome

Baker mahogany china cabinet, and to the crystal torcheres on the mantel. For the youngest daughter, Heide created the ultimate teen fantasy bedroom, not too little-girlish or frilly, but all grown-up

glamour with its offhandedly hung raspberry pink mirror and its lush round charreuse rug. ■
